

**Re: Swine Flu Vaccine for people who work in the dental sector.**  
**Please ignore this letter if you have already received the vaccine.**

Dear Sir or Madam,

The HSE is working to offer a Swine Flu vaccine to everyone living in Ireland over the coming months. We have already started giving the vaccine to people with long-term illnesses, pregnant women and children under 5. In addition, we want all healthcare workers, which includes those working in the dental sector to get vaccinated.

As a healthcare worker it is important that you get the vaccine because:

- you are more likely to come into contact with people who have flu
- you can easily pass pandemic flu to vulnerable patients before you even realise you are ill
- you can easily bring the infection home to your family before you realise you are ill

In order to get the vaccine, you should, in the first instance, contact your GP to find out if they are participating in the vaccination programme and if they have vaccine available. Many GPs are involved in the programme and whilst they targeted the “at risk” population at the start of the campaign, they have been advised to use remaining stocks of vaccine to vaccinate the under 5s, those 65 and over and healthcare workers.

If your GP has no further stocks of vaccine or is not involved we would like **you** to **make an appointment** to attend your local HSE vaccine clinic. Full details of the clinics are available on our website, [www.swineflu.ie](http://www.swineflu.ie) You must have an appointment to attend your vaccine clinic and can make your appointment online for the next available date. Please bring a copy of this letter along with your PPSN number with you when you attend for vaccination.
